Rosewood Class Activity Ideas

Week commencing 23rd March 2020

The topic for this week is 'Life on the Farm' and our focus story is 'The Little Red Hen'. Please find home-school learning activities for the week below.

There are some great online resources that we use to enhance what we are learning. We access these resources via the platform Safeshare.tv. This platform has a content filter for under 5s. Although safeshare.tv uses YouTube and Vimeo as sources for short videos and clips, it cleans up the videos, removes all adverts and unnecessary content and allows us to edit the videos so we are only show the children the required content, in order to enhance our topic.

The Little Red Hen

 Watch and learn the story of The Little Red Hen, told by Pie Corbett. https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=JdvJZD-cplg

Please be strongly advised that this is a direct YouTube link and you are responsible for any subsequent content that may appear around the video. A full screen view often minimises peripheral content, but adverts may still pop up along the bottom of the screen.

We would like you to read the story and discuss the main characters, setting and events. Ask your child open-ended questions such as "Which ingredients did The Little Red Hen gather? Who did she ask for help?" and let your child retell the story in their own words using the pictures as a prompt.

Literacy Activity Ideas based on our Focus story:

1. The Little Red Hen story map:



- Draw a story map to retell the story of The Little Red Hen.
- Add keywords to your story map.
- Colour in the pictures you have drawn. Don't forget to think about the colours you are using.

2. Alternative Story Ending:

Consider and draw a picture of how the story could have ended.

3. Farm themed writing:

- Recall a visit to the farm or otherwise talk about the different animals that live on a farm.
- If possible complete the farm animal labelling worksheet attached. Alternatively, make a list of as many farm animals as you can recall. Encourage the children to use their phonic knowledge to write the words as independently as possible.

Other books you can read are 'Dora's Chicks' by Julie Sykes, 'Rosie's Walk' by Pat Hutchins, 'Farmer Duck' by Martin Waddell, 'A Squash and a Squeeze' by Julia Donaldson and 'What the Ladybird Heard' by Julia Donaldson.



Maths Activities:

1. Seed patterns:

- Create a repeating pattern using a selection of two, three, or four different types of seeds or pulses. You can gradually make the patterns more complex to encourage higher-level thinking skills
- Challenge your child to create a repeating pattern that you can complete.

2. Weight a minute!

- Find five kitchen items in your house and weigh them.
- Encourage your child to predict which one will be heaviest and lightest.
- You can also weigh them comparatively against each other.
- **Challenge:** Look around your house, can you find an item whose weight is the same (equal to) the heaviest and the lightest.

3. <u>"Fewer" and "More"</u>

- Print the number cards (0-10) and then place them face down.
- Take it in turns to turn over a card, and place corresponding objects on a plastic plate.
- Compare the two amounts and discuss which one has "fewer" or "more".
- Record your results.

 Discuss different breads that you have tried, your favourite type of bread, a bread you would like to try.

Expressive Art and Design Activities:

1. The Great Bread Roll Bake:

• Follow the instruction sheet or use the link below to bake your own bread roll, just like The Little Red Hen.

Physical Development Activities

Farmyard Collage:

- Use all available materials (e.g. paint, cardboard, material, glitter etc.) to create a collage of a farmyard.
- P.E challenge of the week How many times can you throw and catch a ball with a partner?

Personal, Social and Emotional Development Activities

1. The power of 'yet'- Two stars and a wish.

- The children will talk about and celebrate two things they have enjoyed doing this term these are the stars.
- They will then talk about one thing they would like to learn during this home learning period this is the wish.
- Write or draw a picture of the wish and put it somewhere visible. Work towards this individual goal with your child over the next couple of weeks.

To bring the story to life and to illustrate the importance of washing hands (for getting rid of germs) you can do a science experiment with water, black pepper and soap to show your child how to wash germs off. We recommend pretending that the black pepper is the 'germs'.
