

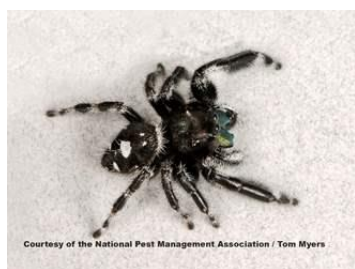

## Brown Recluse Spiders

### What are Brown Recluse Spiders?

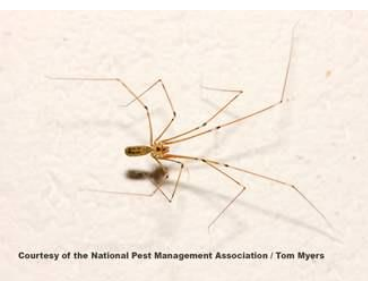
Often identified by a dark brown violin shape on its back, the brown recluse spider is mainly found in the Midwest and Southeast of the United States. It prefers to live in warm, dry and dark environments, such as woodpiles, basements and closets. If this spider bites, it can be very dangerous.

### What is a Jumping Spider?

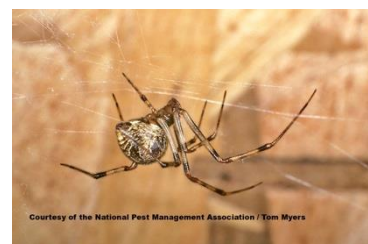
The jumping spider is a type of spider that gets its name from its jumping ability, which it uses to catch prey. There are more than 4,000 known species of jumping spiders in the world, with about 300 species found in the United States and Canada, including the zebra spider.



## Long-bodied Cellar Spiders

### What are Cellar Spiders?

Cellar spiders are a species of spider belonging to the group of animals known as "arachnids." There are both long-bodied as well as short-bodied cellar spiders. As their name implies, cellar spiders are found in dark and damp places like cellars and basements. They are also sometimes referred to as "daddy longlegs" because of their very long, thin legs.
