Activity Title: Broccoli Tree Painting

Learning Intention:	Activity Overview:
To explore colour and how colours can be changed.	Use a broccoli stem and your
	fingers to paint a tree whilst

ACTIVITY IMPLEMENTATION (including key question)	

Introduction:

*Cut the broccoli stem in half from top to bottom and show it to your child giving them the chance to hold and observe it.

* Pour some brown paint in your plastic plate so that it is ready for use when the painting starts. Can your child recognise the colour?

*Squeeze some more colours in another plate for decorating the tree and describe together what you can both see:

*What colours can you see on the plates?

*What do you think that will happen when we mix them?

Main Activity:

*Explain to your child that you will use the broccoli stem as a tool to make your tree trunk.

*Using his/her fingers he/she may then mix some of the colours and talk about any changes that he/she sees whilst printing leaves/blossoms.

*You can also model making your own a tree whilst verbalizing your own thinking.

"I am going to hold the broccoli stem in my hand and carefully dip it into the brown paint. Then I am going to lift it up and press it onto the paper to create my tree print. I am taking my time in pressing down the broccoli stem because it needs to be even on the paper. Then I will carefully put my index finger in the plate with the different colours and then I will press it onto the paper to make my blossoms/leaves.

*Encourage your child to create their own tree.

*What colours will you use for your blossom and leaves?

*Have the colours mixed well together?

*Can you see any new colours you didn't have before?

*What is that colour you have created on the plate?

Activity review:

*Provide your child the chance to give you feedback from the activity.

*Ask him/her questions about the activity and how they feel about it.

*Did you enjoy painting? How do you feel that you used a broccoli to create a painting?

*Did you like that you used your finger to paint the blossoms?

*What did you like most about the activity?
