ACTIVITY IMPLEMENTATION (including key questions)

Introduction:

Scissors PVA Glue

- Revisit the book of the day The Crocodile Who Didn't Like Water and talk about the main character.
- *Who is the main character in the story? Yes, it was actually a dragon! Not a crocodile.
- *What are dragons good at? That's right, flying and breathing fire.

Main Activity:

- Explain to your child that he/she is going to create a fire breathing dragon.
- Show your child the attached *Step by Step Instructions* as an example of what he/she will be creating and what it might look like.
- Gather your resources listed above.
- First, ask your child to paint the toilet roll green (or any colour of his/her choice) and let it dry.
- Using scissors and tissue paper, support your child to cut it into stripes.
- Glue the googly eyes on the green pompoms.
- Once the paint has dried, glue the eyes on the roll and the black pompoms on the other end for the dragon's nostrils.
- On the end with the dragon's mouth, place PVA glue around the inside of the tube. Stick the strips of tissue paper all around. Let it dry.
- Take a deep breath and blow through the end where the eyes are. Watch the flames blow!
- *What colour shall we use for a dragon and flames?
- *Would you like to add anything more?
- *What do we need to do next?



Individual Activity Lesson Plan



Challenge:

• Suggest having a competition: who can blow the flames for the longest?

Additional ways to support your child:

Make your own dragon first for your child to see what is expected from him/her. Verbalise what you are doing and offer as much help as he/she needs.

Extension:

Let your child follow the attached picture instructions and encourage him/her to be as independent as possible whilst creating his/her dragon.
