ACTIVITY IMPLEMENTATION (including key question)

Introduction:

- Look at this picture of 'A person that helps us.' Test to see if your child recognises him.
- Explain to your child what he is holding in his hand and what he uses the Walkie Talkie for.
- Lay out the resources on the table and test to see if your child can name them.

Main Activity:

- Find a small rectangular cardboard box. If you do not have a small cardboard box do not worry. Cut a large piece of cardboard into 6 pieces and stick them together using cellotape to form your own rectangular box like the one shown in this photo. Mummy or Daddy will need to help you with this.
- Paint the box black, or any colour of your child's choice.
- Make a small hole in the top of the box and push through a cardboard straw.
- Your child can now either paint buttons onto the front of their Walkie Talkie or draw buttons onto a piece of paper and with adults help cut them out and stick them onto the front of the Walkie Talkie.
- Maybe Mummy, Daddy or your Sibling could make a matching Walkie Talkie of their own.
- Role model how to use the Walkie Talkie.
- Use the Walkie to communicate and have a conversation with your child.

"Hello Michael, can you hear me.... Over"

Activity review:

- Look at what else a policeman uses.
- Can you child attempt to make anything else which they can use for role play such as hand cuffs.

Additional ways to support your child:

 Role model language for your child throughout this activity, encouraging him/her to repeat words.

Extension:

 Ask your child open ended questions and give them time to reply to encourage them to use more complex, fuller sentences.
