ACTIVITY IMPLEMENTATION (including key question)

Introduction:

- Put a chair in each corner of the room (or outdoors, make a square with four chairs)
- Gather the sets of objects (see instructions above) and keep one object back from each set.
- Place the remaining 3 items on each of the 4 chairs. For example on one chair you may have a bat, a ball and a banana. On another chair you may have a cat, a coat and a cup etc.

Main Activity:

- At first, sit in the middle of the chairs. Name each of the four sets of objects, placing emphasis on the initial sound in each word.
- Explain that now there will be music to move around or dance to. When the music stops, your child
 will need to listen, as you show him/her an object (from the objects you kept back from the sets).
 They should then move to the chair with the matching objects (which also start with the same initial
 letter sound).
- Great emphasis is initially required on the starting sound of each object and whereabouts they are
 placed to ensure your child understands both the concept of the activity and the locations of the
 objects.





Additional ways to support your child:

There are no 'winners' or 'losers'. When your child goes to a corner with a letter sound that is incorrect, they should not be 'out' of the activity. Simply say the word again and model which set of objects it matches with.

Extension:

Introduce the letter that makes the sound to each corner i.e. a group start with the letter 'A' will have the letter displayed with them. This will support your child's development with linking the letter to the sound.
