## **Individual Activity Lesson Plan**

Activity Title: Make a Superhero Mask		
<b>Learning Intention:</b> Imitates drawing simple shapes such as circles and lines.	Activity Overview:  The children will decorate a superhero mask and use it to

## **ACTIVITY IMPLEMENTATION (including key question)**

#### **Introduction:**

- Cut out a mask shape (you can use the template in our online learning section and set it out with the mark-making items you have available provide a few different options if possible.
- Watch or read Supertato with your child and draw attention to the costume he is wearing.
- Invite your child to come and decorate their mask.

#### **Main Activity:**

- Encourage your children to begin making marks on their mask, talking about how they can wear it later to be like Supertato.
- On a separate piece of paper, demonstrate how to make some different marks such as circles, lines and dots. Encourage your child to try making similar marks on their mask. "Look, I've made a little circle. Can you try?"
- Support your child in making different choices regarding colours to use and types of drawing materials. "Would you like to try using the pencil next?" "Which colour will you use now?"
- Once your child is finished decorating their mask, attach the string or elastic by either creating holes
  and tying it on or by taping it to the mask. If you done have these, try taping the mask to a lollipop
  stick or similar sturdy item (pencil, spoon, etc.)

## **Activity review:**


Take your child to a mirror or bring one over and encourage them to try on the mask. "Would you like to try on your mask now?" "Wow, you look like Supertato in the story!" "Are you going to rescue the vegetables from the pea?"

#### Additional ways to support your child:

Offer your child the paper with the mask drawn on before you cut it out so they have plenty of space to make marks and experiment. Alternatively, you could place extra paper beneath the cut-out mask for a similar benefit.

#### **Extension:**

Try creating Supertato's cape and belt with your child to complete the look! They could try copying the 's' on the belt. You could think about using a pillowcase or a long-sleeved top for the cape. We recommend attaching or tying these gently over the shoulder and under the armpit rather than around the neck. Take



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some photos to show your child and encourage them
to look in the mirror at their costume.
