ACTIVITY IMPLEMENTATION (including key qu	lestions)	
Introduction:		
<ul> <li>Main Activity:</li> <li>Explain to your child that you are going to read/watch the story togeth you finish reading/watching, ask your child about the overall story, key and relevant comments.</li> </ul>

*So what happened when the mouse got a cookie? *Which things do you remember that the mouse asked for after? *Is it a nice thing to always ask for something more? *How do you think the little boy felt in the end?		
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\*What did he want to do with the crayon?

## Challenge:

- Once all the picture cards are lined up, ask your child to close his/her eyes. Hide one of the cards and then encourage him/her to guess which item is missing.
- Discover another funny stories by Laura Numeroff such as *If You Give a Moose a Muffin, If You Give a Cat a Cupcake* or *If You Give a Dog a Donut.*
- Suggest to your child to think of a similar title for a book, e.g. *If You Give a Pigeon a Pancake* (challenge him/her for the name of the animal and the item to start with the same sound).
