ACTIVITY IMPLEMENTATION (including key qu	estion)
<ul> <li>Introduction:</li> <li>Show your child the book cover of the story of the day.</li> <li>*What do you think the story is about?</li> <li>*I wonder who a mermaid is.</li> <li>Read/watch the story.</li> <li>Once you have finished reading/watching, talk about the overall story, key events and characters.</li> <li>*What happened to the mermaid?</li> <li>*How do you think the mermaid felt when she had to sing at the circus?</li> <li>*How did she get back to the sea? Who helped her?</li> <li>*What was your favourite part of the story? Why?</li> </ul>	THE Children's Laureste and author of THE CAUTING
<ul> <li>Main Activity:</li> <li>Explain to your child that he/she is going to make and play with foam just</li> <li>Gather your resources listed above.</li> <li>Pour water and a bit of washing up liquid in the cup. Encourage your child</li> <li>Using the blender, whip up the substance into foam.</li> <li>Pour it into bowls or trays together with containers and scooping tools.</li> <li>To make the foam more 'magical', you can add different coloured paint jewels/sequences or shells.</li> <li>Have fun being a mermaid/merman playing with the foam!</li> </ul>	ld to do it independently.
